The question is hardly surprising considering the scale of what we hold in our vaults. Over 100 million images is a fantastically huge number and hard to visualise meaningfully. Perhaps a better way to imagine the breadth of our archives is as a pictorial history timeline from the earliest days of the 20th century right up to the present day, told from a uniquely British perspective.

Actually, that probably doesn't help either...

No, perhaps the best place to start is right here, with Portfolio. We've tried to capture a flavour of our collections, the themes and subjects we've covered over the past 110 years in just a few pages, liberally adorned with the work of some of the foremost photojournalists of the 20th century. Men and women who, in some cases - quite astonishingly given how talented and brave they usually were - you may not ever have heard of until now.

So, for those of you who haven't worked with us before, I hope Portfolio gives you a brief but enlightening taster of some of the many wonderful images you can find with Mirrorpix.

For those of you already acquainted with our collections, our aim is simply to remind you of the work we do in preserving and making available our extensive photographic archives. Along the way we'll hopefully introduce you to new areas of our collections that you haven't seen before and which might be of use to your current creative projects.

But regardless of how much you know about us, my hope is that anyone who picks up a copy of Portfolio finds something to interest them. Our collections are a wonderful, rare time-capsule of history. Being able to share them with publishers and the wider public through your publications and the work you do is an amazing and humbling privilege.

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THE GRANT BROTHERS








The unique Grant Brothers were at the forefront of photojournalism, but it is only now that their talents can be truly recognised

Tom Grant - the eldest of the three - joined the Daily Mirror in early 1904 and became one of the early pioneers of press photography in the UK.

Tom was a seasoned traveller and enjoyed numerous trips to exotic destinations to photograph some remarkable events, such as The Emperor of Japan's funeral and the Coronation of the King of Siam. He is quoted as saying "Always get your pictures before you raise your hat" when photographing the rich and famous.


In 1917, Tom was the official photographer for the Allied Forces in Salonica. As he travelled home aboard the French transport ship, the Sontay, under protection of two gunboats, Tom's ship was hit by a torpedo causing it to rapidly sink.

Before the ship's ultimate demise, Tom, ever the professional, returned to his cabin, grabbed his camera and took an amazing series of photographs.

As well as photographing the British Forces in Salonica during The First World War, he also covered the 1912-13 Balkan Wars, as did his brothers, although capturing the action on different sides.








After the drama of the Balkans, Horace Grant returned to Fleet Street to maintain the family traditions.

He would occasionally write for the Daily Mirror, before going on to become the Picture Editor at the paper. His service to the newspaper would eventually end, but his appetite for photography carried on.

During his retirement, whilst living in Norfolk, Horace would regularly supply the newspaper with beautiful and scenic imagery of the Norfolk Broads.



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CRIPPEN'S EMBARKATION


Bernard Grant joined the Daily Mirror late in 1906 and was inspired to take up a career as a newspaper photographer by the globetrotting adventures of his older brother: "My own entry into Fleet Street came about through a journey my brother, Tom, made to Norway soon after he joined the staff of the newly established Daily Mirror.

"While there he took a photograph of King Haakon of Norway... and this duly filled the front page of the paper. I was greatly impressed by the picture and decided at once that I, too, would tour the world at someone else's expense."

On one assignment, Bernard was dispatched to chase the boat taking the captured murderer Dr Crippen out to the ship which was to return him to the UK for trial.

He also covered the very first Olympic Games to be held in London in 1908.





The Grant Brothers time during the Balkans conflict sharpened their photojournalistic skills and, unbeknown to them, would become vital to the horrors and drama that lay ahead in 1914

During the First World War, Bernard was conscripted into the RNAS as an official war photographer.

He followed the Battle of Jutland and travelled far and wide on all types of naval vessels, ranging from submarines to airships. After a brief stint in the RAF, he returned to the Daily Mirror where he concentrated on Royal tours and ultimately acquired the moniker of Fleet Street's most travelled photographer. His travels got him very close to the Royal Family - so much so, he even taught the Prince of Wales (Edward VIII) how to take photographs!

In 1925, when the Prince of Wales toured Africa and South America, the Daily Mirror secretly dispatched two of its top photographers to cover the tour.

Bernard Grant was sent to Sierra Leone to capture the trip but then had the almost impossible task of getting his images back to London before his rivals. He caught the passenger ship, Zaria, back to London, and once the ship had set sail, presented himself to the captain and handed him a letter. It contained details of a secret plan.

Before Bernard had left for Africa, he, the Mirror and the Shipping Line had agreed that the ship would alter course so it could pass the Portuguese coast. The captain was now let in on the secret and, to avoid Bernard's rivals catching on, kept it to himself. He didn't even nform his fellow officers.

As the ship neared the coast, Bernard sealed his glass plate negatives in a barrel and attached a rubber inner tube. As the liner steamed up the Portuguese coast a tug boat approached.

Bernard's fellow photographers looked on in horror as he threw the barrel down to the tug, thinking he had finally succumbed to sunstroke. Little did they know the tug had been hired by the Mirror to collect the barrel from the liner and deliver it to the famous aviator, Sir Alan Cobham, and his aircraft at Lisbon airport.

Cobham then flew the glass plates to the UK in under a day as the iner made its way across the Bay of Biscay.

When the photographers left the ship at Southampton there, on the front page of the Mirror, were the pictures of the Prince's tour of Africa - a full day ahead of its rivals!


WORLD WAR I THE GREAT WAR




Sports journalist Adam Powley shares his experience of using the Mirrorpix archive and explains how the library has helped him produce stunning, nostalgic, illustrated sport books


As an author and journalist, I've been using the archive for a number of years and I've found its vast store of remarkable images an outstanding resource.








